Report of the President of the ICPR to the PLEN-CC15 mid 2014 - mid 2015

The main events of the session 2014-2015 were:

- 1. The Award of the Thiess International Riverprize
- 2. The Workshop concerning Vogelgrün and subsequent activities
- 3. The ICPR strategy on climate adaptation
- 4. The Workshop Monitoring of 5 and 6 March 2015 in Bonn

1. Thiess International Riverprize and European Riverprize

On 16 September 2014 and one year after having been awarded the very first European River*prize* in Vienna, the International RiverFoundation (IRF) awarded the prestigious Thiess International River*prize* to the ICPR. The Thiess International River*prize* consists of a cash prize of 200.000 AUD (about $140.000 \in$) and a twinning component amounting to 100.000 AUD (about $70.000 \in$).

The prize money for the European Riverprize has been used to draft the recently released ICPR website for children/youngsters (8-14 years).

The twinning component of the European Riverprize (sponsors: GEF, IW:Learn) was implemented in close cooperation with the UNECE. This multilateral exchange of experience in cooperation with the UNECE and further European organizations will be pursued within the framework of the new twinning activities.

2. The Workshop concerning Vogelgrün and subsequent activities

As instructed by the 15th Conference of Rhine Ministers, the ICPR organized an expert meeting in Colmar during 22-24 September 2014 in order to exchange on experience with the restoration of river continuity of the Upper Rhine for migratory fish (upstream migration until Basel). The objective was to find an optimal solution for the restoration of river continuity under the demanding local circumstances at the Vogelgrün/Breisach impoundment. Two possible solutions emerged which will now be be analysed more in detail.

The subsequent activities have been discussed during two meetings of the heads of delegations within the ICPR on 16 December 2014 and on 10 March 2015. These discussions resulted in a draft decision to establish a project group $\underline{\mathbf{O}}$ berrhein/ $\underline{\mathbf{R}}$ hin $\underline{\mathbf{S}}$ upérieur (ORS) (Upper Rhine): The document PLEN-CC15-04-02 includes the background and the mandate for the new project group ORS. The necessity to take further measures to achieve sustainable river continuity upstream into Switzerland were also issues of the PLEN-CC14 in Luxemburg.

In a letter addressed to the operator of the Rhine power plant Iffezheim which was handed out to the participants of the PLEN-CC14, the President of the ICPR then expressed his concern about the longstanding malfunctioning at the Iffezheim fish passage during the mounting of the 5th turbine (April 2009 until October 2013).

Since the end of the construction work on the hydro power plant in Iffezheim, all 3 entrances are again functioning and the numbers of passing salmon, sea trout, sea lamprey, barbel, nase etc. are distinctly above those of preceding years. Among others, in 2014 a total of 87 salmon was registered.

And a new record has now been achieved: Between January and the end of May 2015 142 salmon have already been registered on their upstream migration at Iffezheim!

3. The ICPR strategy on climate adaptation

In the beginning of 2015, the internationally coordinated strategy on climate adaptation for the Rhine catchment has been published (ICPR report no. 219). It presents the major effects of climate change and possibilities for adaptation and is linked to the internationally coordinated implementation of the EU Water Framework Directive (WFD) and of the Flood Management Directive (FD).

The drafts of the second management plan according to the WFD and of the first flood risk management plan according to the Floods Directive are available on the public part of the ICPR website since December 2014 and are thus accessible for public participation until 22 June 2015.

4. The Workshop Monitoring of 5 and 6 March 2015 in Bonn

Following the results of the workshop staged on 5 and 6 March in the BMUB in Bonn in which 80 participants took part, the further development of substance monitoring in the Rhine may now be put into practice.

The possibilities / visions for a comparable approach or at least for comparable results were thoroughly discussed in Bonn. Futhermore, based on practical examples, the possibilities for implementing findings of the "non target analytical chemistry" in applicable risk assessments and reduction measures were discussed. In my opinion, the ICPR is the suitable platform for exchanging information on experience made with the "non target analytical chemistry" in order to achieve a sound preparation of the next steps towards further developing Rhine monitoring.

Further activities

Cooperation with representatives of the NGO with observer status

Apart from the active NGO participation in meetings of working groups and expert groups, a special NGO discussion was organized on 9 June 2015. In proved to be extremely informative for all participants. The list of participants and the major issues discussed are to be found in Annex 1.

This exchange of information again proved how many well informed pressure groups actively support the targets of the ICPR. This is also shown in the outcome of a survey done by a Dutch student last year.

Furthermore, the transboundary cooperation in the Rhine catchment and the intensive involvement of NGOs was positively stressed by several lecturers during the 4th European Water Conference on the implementation of the WFD in Brussels on 23 and 24 March 2015.

Public relations work

Annex 2 to this report includes a survey of the different public relations activities of the secretariat beyond the permanent tasks of every-day organisation of meetings, coordination and assessment of ICPR work.

The list includes lectures of the President of the ICPR and of the staff of the secretariat for various visitors' groups from all over the world, the participation in and lectures during congresses, seminars and other events and gives an overview over publications in technical magazines and/or contributions to reports of other organizations.

Within the coming twinning activities in cooperation with the UNECE, the preparation of the 2nd Rhine-Mekong-Symposium and further organisations the ICPR secretariat or ICPR delegates will in future exchange information with other organisations working on water protection.

Discussions during the exchange of information with NGOs with ICPR observer status concerned the changes in the secretariat, new collaborators and the change of executive secretary as well as important events during the past year, such as the award of the Thiess International Riverprize and the new ICPR website.

New elements of the draft of the 2nd Management Plan according to the WFD and of the Flood Risk Management Plan were presented. Some NGOs (IAWR, BUND, AG Hochrhein, Alsace Nature) indicated that written comments on these issues are currently being drafted. According to the NGOs it would be important to better highlight certain issues, such as the fact that the sturgeon and certain other fish species have still not returned to certain regions. Furthermore, attention was attracted to certain possibly erroneous indications concerning the continuity of the High Rhine. With respect to flood protection it was criticized that many measures have still not been implemented and it was proposed to strengthen the links between flood protection measures and ecological measures, for example regarding flood polders.

Also, preparations of the new ICPR working programme for the period 2016-2021 were presented and, in this connection, the NGOs pointed out the important issue of microand macro-plastic and ongoing studies, and they stressed the value of integral projects.

Furthermore, the NGOs regret their at present restricted resources in personnel and finances for cooperation with the ICPR. The President proposed transboundary and improved coordination among the NGOs.

Marjolein van Eerd presented the results of her analysis of the cooperation between the NGOs and the ICPR within her doctoral thesis. Basically, the NGOs are satisfied with the present cooperation. Problems arise when priorities have to be set, as, at times, schedules and financing do not permit a participation in all meetings.

The President underlined the importance of the NGOs within the ICPR and asked for intensive participation in the PLEN-CC meeting. He also welcomed the spreading of ICPR

publications within the different organisations and asked the NGOs to intensify their mutual exchange of information. $\,$
